

Carter/Pedigo Trail Story Walk™: Richfield Librarian, Diane Nagy approached me with the idea of the Story Boards[™] she saw in a Library circular. We discussed it with our in house sign man, Randy Shero and asked if he could construct something for us. He designed it and we proceeded to ask the Richfield Friends of the Library for a donation to construct them. They gave us \$500 and we did it ! We came pretty close to our budget and installed 16 boards. The Richfield Library changes the Story Walk[™] board once a month on a regular basis.

In conjunction with the Library the Parks and Recreation Department will participate approximately two times a year one being October to do a scary walk, something related to the story on the boards. This year the Revere schools are having the children write poetry and twenty of the best will make it into the boards. We are hoping to also do a fall leave identification in conjunction with the boards.

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Carter/Pedigo Trail Story Walk™ One of the major considerations for this project was the amount of Story Boards to construct. You must remember that in the size that ours are we can place two pages of a book in them. When you decide on a book which must not be copied, you must buy two books to get all the pages. We also have a large kiosk that allows us to add additional pages if needed. You don't want the Boards to be too close together because the purpose is to get the readers to walk! Our boards are secured into the ground with concrete.

As noted before the construction took \$500, this does not include the in-house labor to construct or install. Construction was done off site and then assembly was done on the trail. There was a lot of carrying done because of the "rough" terrain, bridges and steps, most of the pieces had to be carried in along with the cement bags to secure the posts.

This project is accessible from our local library parking lot and is used by many residents as well as other walkers and hikers as the word spreads.



Carter/Pedigo Trail Story Walk™ The benefits of this trail are many. They provide "family" inexpensive activities to do as well as invite non-community people to our community. They come to walk and enjoy the trail and find the Story Walk as an added benefit. The Story Boards interest everyone, you can't help but to be drawn to them, the most are simple to read and are fun.

We hear that many hiking groups plan their hikes on the Carter/Pedigo trail on purpose, not only because of the wonderful hike it provides but because it is fun.



Carter/Pedigo Trail Story Walk™ Our biggest sense of what people say comes from the Library which is located at the Trail Head of the Carter/Pedigo Trail. When people are done walking some of them stop in the Library (maybe to use their bathrooms) but to share the awe that they have experienced.



The best part of this program is the cooperation between the Richfield Library and the Village of Richfield. The generous donation of the Friends of the Library, (\$500) and the great idea of Ms. Diane Nagy, Richfield's children's Librarian made this project possible. Our service department sign man, Randi Shero, whose creative thinking made the design possible.

Our suggestion is that you place enough signs as not to limit the size of the book. Most books are about 30-40 pages. Secure the posts in so that they cannot be tipped over or pulled out. And make sure they are as water proof as possible.

The possibilities are endless. We now cater to the young person but we can easily change the theme to do only nature books about what's in the park or about the wildlife or even wild flowers.

After the construction of the project the most important person is a dedicated person to be on the lookout for the right books, and the dedication to change the Story Boards all year long, in snow, rain or even the heat of summer. This we credit to Ms. Nagy!
